North Street Records isn't just a store; it's a cornerstone of Normal's music scene, celebrating its impressive 20th anniversary this year as a beloved part of the Uptown Normal central business district.

The story begins with the owners' shared love of music. They built their record collection while working together at Mother Murphy's, an iconic local headshop and "Rock N' Roll Emporium" specializing in cannabis and tobacco paraphernalia as well as classic music memorabilia. Their passion fueled their dream, leading them to open their own store in Uptown Normal, which they regarded as "a destination of music and fun," a spirit that endures today.

Back when the store first opened, record collecting was a niche hobby. "Customers were rare," recalls co-owner Rob Streibech. Despite the slow start, their love for music never wavered. Co-owner Jeff Wilson, known as a tastemaker for Normal's music scene, stocked local CDs in the store and even booked punk and rock bands to play within their cramped storefront. As music culture shifted and vinyl regained popularity, so did North Street Records. Uptown Normal's transformation from more than a college town to a tourist destination further boosted business. Their proximity to Waiting Room Records, another beloved record store that opened the same year, created a hub for local music enthusiasts.

The impact of these two local record stores continues to this day. Owners of Waiting Room Records have further grown the popularity of records through promotional sales and the spread of local music and awareness for the Humane Society of Central Illinois through a collaboration with Town of Normal to create the small music festival, "Look We're Just Trying to Do Something Nice, Ok? Live @ Connie Link." North Street Records' influence continues when Jim, another co-owner, leveraged his connections to bring his favorite band, The Supersuckers, to Normal's Make Music Normal festival; their headline performance will take place starting at 8:45 p.m. Saturday, June 29 on the North Street stage. A dedicated fan, Jim has seen them perform over 30 times, amassing a large signed-record collection and a personal connection with the band. This long-standing love and connection helped Town of Normal staff secure them for the festival, which celebrates its own milestone (10th) anniversary this year.

The music-loving owners of North Street Records have a simple mission: to share their passion and spark joy in others. Their dedication ensures that North Street Records will continue to be a vibrant hub for music lovers in Normal for years to come.
